ONLINE CLASS EXPERIENCE

Zoom links are emailed to registered students approximately 3 to 5 days before the first class. Please make sure to check for the link at least 24 hours before your class. If it's not in your inbox, make sure to check your junk or spam file. If not there, email olliregistrations@docs.rutgers.edu.

REFUND POLICY



MEMBERS

Multi-week courses (5 weeks and above): A full refund for multi-week courses will be provided if we receive the request in writing before the start of the fourth class. **Courses that are 2-4 weeks**, refunds are available if OLLI-RU is notified before the start of the second class. Refunds will be issued in the original form of payment and only to the individual who paid for the class.

One-day programs: Refunds will be issued for one-day programs if OLLI-RU is notified in writing before the program takes place.

NON-MEMBERS

Multi-week courses: A full refund for multi-week courses will be provided if we receive the request in writing before the start of the second class. Refunds will be issued in the original form of payment and only to the individual who paid for the class.

One-day programs: no refunds for one-day programs.

OLLI-RU does not record online classes on a regular basis, but students may ask their instructor if they need a specific class recorded for any reason. Some may want to protect that material by not allowing a recording of their course to be disseminated. Please respect an instructor's decision.

MISSED CLASSES

Individual classes that are canceled for any reason by OLLI-RU or the instructor will be made up either by adding additional time to each remaining class or by extending the class by an additional meeting.

CANCELED COURSES

Students registered for a course that gets canceled will be notified approximately one week before the class is scheduled to start. You can transfer to an alternate open class or receive a refund.

Registration Fee Change for Spring 2026

Beginning with the Spring 2026 session (starts March 2026), you will notice a modest increase in OLLI-RU course registration fees. The rates are primarily a return to the fees we had in Spring 2023 before they were lowered that Fall in honor of OLLI-RU's 30-year anniversary.

For members, rates for most courses will go from \$8 per week to \$10 per week. For non-members, most courses will go from \$12 per week to \$15 per week. The membership fee remains the same.

We have worked hard to keep our courses affordable, and we remain deeply grateful for the ongoing support of Rutgers University, our dedicated instructors, Advisory Council, and volunteers.

Because registration fees are OLLI-RU's sole source of revenue, this adjustment is necessary to maintain the program's strength and sustainability. We hope to ensure a continued capability to offer high-quality courses, expert instructors, and a welcoming community that makes OLLI-RU such a special place to learn.

In the Time of the Tudors: The Pole Family

Margaret Pole, Countess of Salisbury, was the niece of the last two Plantagenet kings of England, Edward IV and Richard III, and the cousin of Queen Elizabeth, wife of Henry VII. She held a strong claim to the English throne, yet she served with loyalty in the courts of both Henry VII and Henry VIII. She was a confident of Queen Katherine of Aragon and the governess of Princess Mary. As Henry VIII's marriage to Katherine unraveled, the allegiance of the Pole family came under suspicion and Lady Margaret, with her sons Geoffrey and Henry, attempted to ride out the rising storm of Henry VIII's wrath against her other son, Cardinal Reginald Pole. Whose Beaches? Power, Policy and the Jersey Shore

For the past 200 years we have been fighting over who gets to use the Jersey Shore and for what. Sometimes these battles have been fought with clubs and fists, sometimes in the Legislature, and sometimes in the courts. We will consider five episodes, ranging from the "oyster wars" of the early 19th century to the contemporary struggles over hurricanes, "shore protection," and the rising ocean. Each episode has involved a set of public policy choices, active players, and both short-term and long-term consequences. We will read original sources, consider the policy choices, and follow the consequences of each of these battles. Our primary mode of learning will be conversation, discussion and debate. Watercolor Painting and Drawing: Decorative Patterns from World Cultures

We will draw and paint beautiful patterns inspired by the decorative arts of Europe, South Asia, the Australian Aboriginal, and the African Continent. Drawing and painting samples will be provided by the instructor. The material has been developed so that it is available to students at all levels of ability: no previous art experience is required. Class Descriptions:

- 1. Paint motifs from Southern African fabrics with watercolor using a wax resist technique.
- 2. Draw motifs from Australian Aboriginal culture by Stippling (drawing swirling clusters of dots) with magic markers.
- 3. Create examples of European knotwork in watercolor.
- 4. Draw a decorative paisley from India with magic markers.
- 5. Create examples of NORTH AFRICAN geometric patterns in watercolor.

Required Materials: Prang Watercolor Oval Pan Set, 8 colors. This set includes a mixing tray and #6 round watercolor brush; Student grade #0 watercolor round brush; Clear wax crayons; Magic markers.

The Final Frontier: Star Trek at 60

Where were you on a Thursday night September 8, 1966 at 8:30pm? It was the night that the NBC television network introduced its viewers to the very first episode of a new science fiction program produced at Desilu studios in Hollywood called *Star Trek*. It was pitched to the network by creator Gene Roddenberry as a wagon train in space but it became much more than that.

This course explores how that TV show came about, why, although it only lasted 3 years, it still has such broad appeal and is still both relevant and popular today, almost 60 years later. Prior to each of our classes we will watch assigned episodes from the original series only (1966-1968) and then have some in class discussions. A Very Short Intro to Artificial Intelligence (AI)

Artificial Intelligence (AI) seems to make headlines every day—but what does it really mean? This short course will help you make sense of the rapidly changing world of AI through engaging lectures, live demonstrations, and hands-on exploration. We'll examine what AI is, where it came from, and where it's headed—meeting the pioneers who started it all and the innovators shaping its future. Participants are encouraged to bring a laptop, tablet, or a smartphone to try the exercises, giving you the opportunity to experiment directly with AI tools.

Along the way, we'll discuss key ideas such as how to write effective prompts; the difference between artificial intelligence AI), artificial general intelligence (AGI), and artificial superintelligence (ASI); and the potential benefits—and risks—of this increasingly powerful technology. We'll also demystify some of today's buzzwords, from "multimodal models" to "GPUs" and "NVIDIA," the hardware and companies central to AI's computational advances. Participants will come away with a working understanding of today's AI tools and a foundation for following future developments in the field. No prior technical experience is required—just curiosity and a willingness to explore. (course code HYV20)

Disunion in America: A Brief History of Secession in the U.S.

Many such similar historical situations and political conditions would follow as America grows and expands creating new grounds for separation or secession from the Union. (course code RV25)
